We need to have an adult discussion about this issue. I will have an anonymous survey available at the October meeting to collect ideas, with a discussion at the November meeting.





More tidbits from our collection of old crafting newsletters: A Shoofly block, I see, was also called Corn and Beans...where do these names come from?!? There was a reprint of a Kansas City Star pattern from 1930. And a Rainbow Tile quilt, based on Venetian tiles, was made of hexagons. What goes around, comes around, right? A Hearts Desire block was labeled for expert quilt makers only: "This is for the woman who can make the most difficult pattern. Allow for seams, be careful when cutting patterns. Patience and skill are required, otherwise leave this quilt to those who have both." I notice many items in the 1965 newsletter classifieds were selling for ten cents or \$2. Adjusted for inflation, these prices would be \$1 and \$19 today! ~Sheila


